

Dear Friends,

When I took on the role of Acting Superintendent for this year I wasn't sure what to expect. The increase in the number of emails and items of post I receive has been noticeable even in the past few weeks. One of the things that has arrived in my letter box is a report produced by the Methodist Church into the factors that help churches to grow.

The study was conducted in the North East of England and so, in quite a different context to ours, but nevertheless the findings of the report's authors, Dr Andrew Orton and Dr Peter Hart give us some food for thought. They conclude that key factors contributing to church growth are:

- Being welcoming, hospitable and caring as a church community
- Being responsive and actively inclusive of a wider range of people
- Making available accessible intentional spiritual development opportunities
- · Participatory and collaborative leadership
- Provision of support which enabled change and overcame barriers.

They go on to look at six different churches who are experiencing growth and what can be learnt from their situations.

All the factors outlined above present us with a challenge as a church and as individuals. Whenever we think about church growth and evangelism we can easily become daunted and overwhelmed by the scale of the task but the authors

note that 'small acts of unconditional kindness and hospitality' were key to drawing people into the life of the church. What this meant in practice was the existing community made room for people, listened to their needs and responded to their ideas. Inevitably the church then became a dynamic community, open to new possibilities, prepared to take risks, willing to try new things and able to learn and grow along the way.

Over the coming weeks there are a number of Special Sundays in the life of our church including Harvest, World Church, and Remembrance Sunday. These are opportunities to reflect on the role of our church within the local community and within the world.

At the end of their report Orton and Hart suggest that a church asking itself - 'how do we best embody the Gospel in this place?' is the most effective place to begin a new journey of spiritual growth and discovery. As we look to the future

I wonder where will God lead us as we explore the answers to that question together?



Church Redevelopment Update No. 6

As you may recall from our last update, we arranged to lodge a pre-application planning proposal for our redevelopment with the Bromley Council in July. This was duly done and a meeting was held on 14th September 2017 attended by two planning officers, John Spence (our architect), Christine Pope and Laura MacBean.

The officers agreed in principle with all our plans for the church and community centre and explained that for zoning purposes they were pleased we wished to continue with our church life and community engagement. They were, however, not so enamoured with the density of housing we were trying to fit onto the site. We now await their written feedback which we will be analysing, along with John Spence, in order to come up with a design for the accommodation that they will be more willing to approve. John is already working on some alternatives so that we can move forward as soon as possible. As you will be aware, the accommodation on the site is what will cross-subsidise our new church and community centre.

Once we have the feedback from the planning office and have had a chance to sit down with John to consider the alternatives he is drafting, we will be able to report back to everybody and advise on our the next steps.

QUARTERLY PRAYER BREAKFASTS


JOINT ADVENT COURSE 2017

The course material is based on a book by the Bishop of Chelmsford, Stephen Cottrell, called Walking Backwards to Christmas (not to be confused with the Goon Show song!). The book starts with Anna, the prophetess in the temple at Jesus dedication, and travels back in time to Moses, called by God from a burning bush. It consist of a series of monologues inspired by a painting The Nativity and the Burning Bush which is illustrated on the book cover.

We will be offering a Tuesday evening course and a Thursday morning course in the hope that more people will be able to attend. The leader of each church will host the sessions at his or her church. The first half an hour will be a time for refreshments and fellowship



and the hour thereafter will focus on the course material for the session.

If you would like to buy the book to read over advent in addition to or instead of attending the study series, here are the details:

JANET'S CHALLENGE No. 9

On August 22nd I and my fellow wing walkers and our supporters (my mother, 5 of my sister's grandchildren and her daughter) drove to a small airfield near Cirencester to complete our charity challenge. As we parked the cars a biplane was flying overhead; it made a thunderous noise as it banked steeply above us and we wondered what we had let ourselves in for.



We met the representative from the Lymphoma Association; she interviewed Sue and me, finding out why we had chosen this event and the charity. Then we blew up balloons for the children to go with their purple and white pompoms, ready to practise their cheerleading.

We were taken for our briefing and safety talk with the professional wing walkers and then got dressed in flying overalls. I was first up and met my pilot; he decided that, as we were doing this for charity, they would get a second plane ready so we could have a joint flypast. Phil decided he would go up second so he got ready as I climbed onto the top wing of my plane.

The plane trundled down the grass ready to take off: I was on top feeling a mixture of excitement and apprehension but this turned to exhilaration as we



took off and made our first steep bank. The next 10 minutes was a blur of steep climbs and dives and sharp turns; every time we came past the crowd I had my arms up waving—it was hard work holding my arms up against the tremendous force of the wind. Phil's plane joined mine in a couple of flypasts before I landed and he took his turn to fly. I climbed down from the plane absolutely buzzing





from the thrill of my wing walk. Sue was next up and was joined 10 minutes later by Trevor for their joint flypast. We were all elated as we lined up for a final photo in front of the plane – what a fantastic experience.

To date we have raised £1,700 for the Lymphoma Association; thank you so much for your help in reaching this amount.

CAFE & CRAFT CLUB

Holiday stay and play events

Unfortunately I was away for a month and unable to run the holiday stay and play craft club and café on Thursdays until the last two weeks of August. After advertising it on the West Wickham Mums facebook page a few days before the 24th of August, I planned some crafts around an African theme (having been in South Africa myself!) and was very surprised to welcome over 30 children and 18 adults (mums, dads, grandparents and child minders) on the day. The following week we had a 'forest' theme with about six adults and 15 children. The children love the activities, adults can sit and chat or help their charges do the crafts, and it is generally a lovely relaxing morning for all ages.

Using the church space is quite deliberate. There is more space for all ages and to zone activities if needed, we have the craft tables ready in church for us and don't infringe on the people using other parts of the building. Plus of course it is lovely to share our beautiful space with others and help people who do not often come into church spaces to feel more comfortable there. It is also a great opportunity for me and others from our church to connect with people from the community and to provide a service to all those parents, grandparents and child minders who need somewhere local and inexpensive to keep their variously aged children busy during the holidays.

Help with donations of cakes and with setting up, tidying away or serving at the café is always welcome. The sessions run from 10.00 am to 12 noon and involve setting out a toddler play area with loads of Lego and Duplo, plus some colouring in, drawing and the craft materials, with samples on different tables. We also have some homemade cakes (if possible), fruit, biscuits, other snacks, tea, coffee and squash to which people can help themselves for a donation. The café tables are set out in a specific refreshment zone—to avoid crumbs everywhere!

Thanks to those who have offered to help at the next session on 26th October during the half term break and to those who were able to help on 31 August. We will also be running one on a 'Nativity' theme on 21st December if you are able to help then.


"Oh no," sighed the man "nothing like that. I was given the third name when the vicar dropped me in the font."



FELLOWSHIP GROUP FILM NIGHT

Based on the book by Margot Shetterly the film tells the true and moving story of three African-American women who worked for NASA in the early days of the space race.. Katherine Johnson a mathematician and human "computer"; Mary Jackson, an aspiring engineer, and Dorothy Vaughan their unofficial supervisor. The film shows many events, from Katherine getting asked to join the Space Task Group, to Mary taking night classes at a boy's school so she could get her engineering degree, to Dorothy stealing a book from a white-only library, reading up on FORTRAN, and being the only woman at the time to know how to run the IBM 7090 computer.



These women went through Jim Crow laws in 1960s Virginia, and they still succeeded in getting John Glenn in orbit around the Earth. Jim Crow laws and racism did not stop them from accomplishing their goals.

A THOUGHT FOR REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

My twin brother George like me was a school teacher. We sometimes discussed our reactions to various situations which we encountered at our schools.

Many years ago he was teaching English in Luton to Pakistani boys for whom English was a foreign language. Unfortunately these boys faced much physical and verbal abuse from the English boys. One evening George was leaving school at the end of the day having finished preparing his lessons for the following day when he saw one of the Pakistani boys lurking in the corridor. The boy told George that he was afraid to leave school as there were four boys outside waiting to beat him up. George said to him, "I shall walk straight towards those boys and you make a run for it." The following day George saw the headmaster about the incident. The Head told him that he would get another teacher to cover for his lesson while he went round each class in the school to identify the bullies. Luckily he recognised each one and so the Head arranged a meeting with the four bullies and their parents.

At the meeting George was expecting the Head to give them a talking to about their unacceptable behaviour but instead he said to them, "Mister Manuell has something to say to you." George was shocked for the moment but thought quickly and said to the boys, "I am very proud to be British. Are you proud to be British?" They sheepishly agreed. He then said "My Dad, who was a man of

peace, went to war against the Nazis along with thousands of others so that people in Britain whatever colour, religion, race, or gender could walk down the street without fear of being harassed, bullied or abused and now your behaviour is betraying their sacrifice. I want you to think about what you have been doing to these Pakistani boys in the light of what I have just said."



My brother said that they and their parents looked remorseful but he often wondered if they took what he said to heart.

If it's true that we are here to help others, then what exactly are the others here for?


